Business Services

B usiness Services is responsible for Facilities Planning, Fiscal Services (including Payroll/Benefits and Accounting), Internal Audit, Risk Management, Procurement, and the Central Warehouse. This year our division was heavily involved in the design and preparation for Banner, our new enterprise resource planning (ERP) system. A major accomplishment for the Facilities Planning department was putting the finishing touches on two major college construction projects – Gateway at Saddleback College and the Fine Arts Village at Irvine Valley College. Some fiscal highlights in 2022-23 include:

- Total POs & Contracts Issued: 5,971
- Value: \$187.6 million
- Total RFQ&Ps & Bids Issued or Awarded: 44
- Value: \$152.8 million
- Total Financial Aid Paid to Students: \$32.2 million

Human Resources

uman Resources provides services and support in hiring, employee relations, compensation, and staff development which enables our employees to contribute to student success. Key 2023 achievements include:

- In May, SOCCCD received a \$300,000 Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) Innovative Best Practices Grant to bolster the Building Leadership Opportunities through Outstanding Mentorship (BLOOM) program. The district will increase cohort sizes, enhance stipends, and fortify efforts in recruitment. These initiatives aim to ultimately create a more diverse faculty on our campuses.
- In May, 27 employees completed the first Excellence in Communication and Educational Leadership (EXCEL) Academy. The success of the first cohort generated a tremendous amount of interest for the 2024 academy, with the district receiving 88 applications, with 35 participants selected from classified, faculty, and management employees.
- Completed the project of fully cross-training HR staff for optimum efficiency.
- Participated in local job fairs to increase recruitment efforts.
- Filled HR Compliance and Title IX Analyst position to keep in compliance with regulations and accreditation standards.

Educational & Technology Services

E ducational & Technology Services leads and/or assists with the coordination and review of educational programs and technology services offered in the district. A few of our accomplishments in 2023 include:

- Banner Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) business process analysis, system configuration, data load, and backend system testing sessions.
- Formation of the Public Safety Advisory Committee and development of the Public Safety Compact.
- Partner with the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office for Full Time Equivalent Students simulations based on proposed changes to the Student Attendance Accounting Manual and provided detailed information to the Common ERP Project Team.
- Efforts to streamline existing cybersecurity software and consolidate applications under the Microsoft A5 Premium license.
- Progress on the 508 Compliance assessment recommendations.
- Development of tabletop exercises to support business continuity.
- Completion of the district firewall refresh.



Staff Highlights

INVESTITURE CEREMONY For the first time, on April 27, 2023, SOCCCD held an investiture ceremony for a new chancellor. The ceremony brought together the county's community and educational leaders to welcome and honor Chancellor Barnes. At the event, the chancellor shared her "First 100 Days and Beyond: Listening Tour Report" which highlighted her observations on the district's strengths and the challenges moving forward.





Through consistent employee efforts, both colleges were awarded the prestigious Aspen Prize "Top 150" – recognizing them as one of the best 150 colleges in the country for delivering equitable outcomes for Black and Hispanic students, and for improving retention and graduation rates.

EXCEL ACADEMY 2023

In May 2023, the district celebrated the graduation of 27 employees who completed the first Excellence in Communication and Educational Leadership (EXCEL) Academy cohort. Drawing from classified, faculty, and management employees, the academy focuses on teaching management and work-related skills that fosters diversity and inclusion in all district functions.

BLOOM FACULTY INTERNSHIP PROGRAM In 2023, SOCCCD received a \$300,000 EEO Innovative Best Practices Grant to bolster the Building Leadership Opportunities through Outstanding Mentorship (BLOOM) program. By connecting current faculty as mentors to prospective teachers, the BLOOM program provides hands-on training and helps the district create a more diverse faculty presence on campus.

LEGISLATIVE ADVOCACY One of the important functions of district leadership is advocating for public policies that benefit college students. A delegation from SOCCCD (above) visited Washington, D.C., in January 2023, to meet with several local congressional members in an effort to get key legislation passed. The district's 2023 legislative goals included: increasing resources for student veterans; helping students overcome non-academic barriers (such as housing, food and healthcare); and advocating for DACA students to pursue their education without fear of deportation. **GROUNDBREAKINGS** There were several groundbreaking ceremonies in 2023, with district leadership supporting a robust program of improving facilities to provide students with the best possible learning environments. The board and chancellor officiated at the ceremonies at three groundbreaking ceremonies at ATEP (Saddleback@ATEP buildings, Goddard School, and Advantech). In December, the board and chancellor attended the groundbreaking for the award-winning Science Math building (below) at Saddleback College.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

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In 2023, Chancellor Barnes was selected to serve on the Orange County Business Council's Board of Directors (swearing in on the right). The OCBC provided the district with valuable input on workforce development. A recent study showed that SOCCCD contributed more than 20,000 jobs and billions of dollars in economic activity to the county.

District Improvements

D istrict Services and the colleges work collaboratively to create welcoming, safe, and state-of the-art spaces for our dynamic courses, programs, and services. The Facilities Planning Department annually manages 15-20 district-wide projects in various stages. Facilities Planning is shaping the future of SOCCCD through the Facilities Master Plan, which guides all projects through 2040. The plan includes sustainable designs, while also addressing critical accessibility and infrastructure needs on each campus.

SADDLEBACK COLLEGE'S GATEWAY BUILDING This \$65 million project consists of a three-story building with a total of 77,985 gross square feet. It hosts nine student services departments, including counseling, admissions, veterans services, and financial aid. Gateway is intended as a welcome center for students entering the campus – a central place to get their questions answered and help in navigating the many aspects of attending college.





INSIDE GATEWAY With a digital queue, students can hang out in the lounge and not wait in a line. The interior is an open concept, with fewer walls and low-rise furniture that gives a feeling of welcoming accessibility – and it has great wi-fi!





IRVINE VALLEY COLLEGE'S ARTS VILLAGE The \$61 million project consists of three buildings with a total of 62,471 gross square feet. The village consolidates the Fine Arts department in one location, where instruction will include art, art history, music, and dance. The Arts Village includes classrooms, a gallery, assembly hall, labs, and offices.















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
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
