

Combined, Irvine Valley College and Saddleback College offer 400 degrees and certificates to a diverse population of students to help them achieve their academic and career goals.




Employees





2026 FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES



SOCCCD has identified several Federal legislative priorities to include, but not limited to the following:



Workforce Development & Career Tech Education

Increase federal investment in workforce training programs—including Strengthening Community College Training Grants, Perkins CTE, WIOA, and NSF's Advanced Technological Education program—and support a National Apprenticeship Act to strengthen community colleges' leadership in STEM education, workforce development, and apprenticeships. As Workforce Pell is implemented, ensure Department of Education regulations support high-quality, affordable certificate programs at community colleges and do not impose unnecessary administrative burdens that would limit access, innovation, or institutional participation.



Veterans

Ensure that active-duty personnel and their dependents can fully participate in community college educational programs. Enact reforms that help veterans choose the educational program that best suits their needs and prevents their exploitation. Advocate for continued benefits that support housing and other basic needs.



Basic Needs Services

Streamline access to public benefits like SNAP, WIC, Medicaid, TANF, and housing programs for eligible community college students. Expand federal support for essential campus and community-based services, including child care, mental health, and basic needs, while protecting CCAMPIS grants to ensure quality childcare and facility improvements.



Student Protection and Support-aid Integrity

Support comprehensive immigration reform that expands access to higher education and workforce opportunities by providing undocumented students a pathway to citizenship and access to federal financial aid, while strengthening policies that retain international talent and allow students on temporary visas to complete their education and transition into high-need workforce sectors. Federal efforts should also strengthen education data systems and student-aid integrity to promote accountability, transparency, and equitable access without creating undue administrative barriers for community colleges.



College Affordability through Pell Grant and Federal Aid

Support and strengthen federal student aid programs that ensure college affordability and workforce access for low-income and working students. Protect and enhance the Pell Grant program by defending it from proposed cuts or eligibility restrictions, increasing the maximum award, and making Pell tax-free even when used for cost-of-attendance components such as housing, food, and other basic living expenses. Additionally, support robust funding for Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSI) and other Minority-Serving Institutions (MSI), along with Federal Work-Study, FSEOG, and TRIO programs, recognizing their critical role in advancing student success, equity, and workforce readiness.





2026 STATE LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES



SOCCCD has identified several State legislative priorities to include, but not limited to the following:



Housing and Basic Needs

Propose state grants to fund affordable housing projects on community college campuses, aiming to secure statewide funding for projects in SOCCCD. Advocate for funding per college in flexible funding for short-term homelessness prevention, enabling flexible temporary housing solutions and on-campus support to address the specific needs of students in our communities.




Veterans Education and Workforce Success

Support state investments that expand and strengthen veteran-serving programs at California community colleges, including dedicated counseling, mental health supports, credit for prior military learning, and accelerated pathways into high-demand careers. Ensuring stable funding for these services is essential to helping veterans successfully transition from military service to higher education and the civilian workforce.



Infrastructure for Students

Invest in the modernization and expansion of community college facilities through California's capital outlay process, including state-funded bond programs and scheduled maintenance and instructional equipment funding, to ensure campuses can support workforce training, applied learning, and student success aligned with regional and statewide economic needs. Investments should prioritize aging facilities, specialized instructional spaces, climate resiliency, and deferred maintenance that directly impact instructional quality. Ensure community colleges have dedicated and sustainable funding to acquire, upgrade, and maintain instructional and operational technology, including high-speed broadband infrastructure, network security, cloud-based systems, and industry-standard equipment, so students can fully participate in digital learning environments and meet evolving workforce and transfer requirements.



Expand Access to High-Demand Workforce Education, Baccalaureate Degrees

Provide targeted and sustained funding to California community colleges to address documented workforce shortages—particularly in nursing, allied health, and other high-demand workforce sectors—by expanding program capacity across certificates, associate degrees, and community college baccalaureate degrees. This includes supporting baccalaureate degrees in nursing and other critical workforce areas, modernizing instructional delivery, investing in clinical and instructional infrastructure, strengthening employer and health-system partnerships, and removing structural barriers to student entry, persistence, and completion.
